

Audubon Naturalist-Staffed Spotting Scopes

On your trip around the River S unit, stop at the Hunt Gate (just after mile marker 4) to visit with Vancouver Audubon Society birders staffing the scoping station overlooking the wetlands of the hunt zone, an area not usually open for public access. We hope to view dancing Sandhill Cranes again this year. Please proceed to parking inside the gate.
