Portland Community College's Therapeutic Learning Garden (TLG), the first healing and learning garden of its kind on a college campus, is currently under development. When completed, it will provide pioneering, replicable curricula for creating healing sanctuaries and vibrant learning environments. The garden will become a cutting-edge hub of natural and neurological innovation that will benefit PCC faculty, staff and students, as well as surrounding neighborhood residents, the Portland Oregon metropolitan region, and beyond.

- Practicum Site for PCC's horticultural therapy program
- Nature-Neuro¹ Laboratory applying cutting edge research to design healing spaces and enriched learning activities
- Formal and Informal Learning Spaces for multiple disciplines and programs
- Training Site for professionals applying therapeutic horticulture
- Demonstration Areas for home, business, health facility, school and park gardens
- Natural Calming Setting for restoration, meditation, reflection and movement

PCC Gerontology's Horticultural Therapy Program began in 2008 in collaboration with Legacy Health Systems, and was led and inspired by Teresia Hazen. Our program prepares students for Horticultural Therapist-Registered (HTR) designation, and provides students still working on AHTA HTR requirements to develop the knowledge and skills to work as therapeutic horticulture activity specialists with diverse populations in a variety of settings.

What the PCC Horticultural Therapy Program Offers

- A Therapeutic Horticulture Activity Specialist Certificate of 38 (term) credits, including the core horticultural therapy courses, as well as activity, psychology, and gerontology courses designed to prepare students to work with older persons in long-term care, memory care, senior and older adult centers, parks and recreation, and residential settings.
- The core 13 credits of horticultural therapy courses and the 36 credits of horticulture and human science courses required by the AHTA for Horticultural Therapist-Registered (HTR) status.
- Internship opportunities, meeting AHTA standards, supervised by an HTR.

Program Details

The program is currently accredited by the American Horticultural Therapy Association through Legacy Health System, and will be re-accredited through PCC in January 2018, when the core courses are transplanted to the PCC Sylvania Campus in Winter term 2018. The sequence of 6 core courses will be offered over 6 terms, in a class-web format, with 2-3 Saturday meetings.
